Digital Storytelling in Instructional Design

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Part 1: Understanding Digital Storytelling

Reflection

Part 2: Story Concept Development

Topic

Helping students build creativity and confidence in the classroom

Objective

After watching this video, aspiring or current teachers will be able to demonstrate how to encourage creativity, build student confidence, and provide feedback that supports students' growth.

Storyboard Elements

Characters

- Ms. Parker (Art Teacher): Ms. Parker is a dedicated art teacher with years of experience. She's passionate about creating a classroom environment where students feel confident enough to express themselves. Throughout the story, she helps her students work through struggles and find joy in their creative process.
- Jamie (Student): Jamie is a high school student who loves art but struggles with self-doubt. They often second guess their abilities and worry that their work isn't good enough.
- Other Students (in the background): These are the students who are actively working on their projects, each at different stages of the creative process. They're here to show that art is personal and everyone moves at their own pace.

Setting

Challenge

Jamie's struggling to find the confidence to complete their artwork, feeling like it's not good enough. They're ready to give up. The challenge is for Ms. Parker to help Jamie break through their self doubt and guide them to a place where they feel proud of their work.

Resolution

Ms. Parker helps Jamie build self confidence by encouraging her creativity, offering constructive feedback, and positive reinforcement.

Media

Video Narrative/Live-Action: The video is primarily live-action, showing Ms. Parker working directly with Jamie and offering guidance. It will showcase key moments where Ms. Parker provides encouragement and feedback that helps Jamie regain their confidence.

Still Images: Close up shots of Jamie's artwork will be used to highlight their progress and how the artwork evolves with feedback.

Voice Over: A voiceover will give additional insights into teaching strategies, explaining what's happening in each scene and offering tips for fostering creativity and confidence in the classroom.

Script

Scene 1: Starting the Class

(The scene opens in the busy art classroom. Students are scattered around, working on various projects. Ms. Parker walks through, stopping by each student to give a little encouragement. Jamie is sitting at a desk, staring at their artwork, clearly frustrated.)

Ms. Parker (approaching Jamie):

"Hey Jamie, how's it going with your project?"

with the right guidance, they can achieve more than they thought possible."

proud of their growth.)

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Scene 1
